NJLTAP and the 110th Annual League of Municipalities Conference

In November, the NJLTAP participated in the three-day New Jersey State League of Municipalities (NJSLOM) Annual Conference in Atlantic City, NJ. The event, which included over 700 exhibitors and 175 education sessions, was attended by some 16,000 local government officials and affiliates.

We partnered with the New Jersey Chapter of the American Public Works Association, which is the official public works affiliate to the NJSLOM, to deliver two workshops to conference attendees on Wednesday, November 19th. Both workshops awarded Certified Public Works Managers license credits to participants.

NJLTAP also exhibited over the course of the event to promote training offerings and technical assistance referral services to local public agencies. Among the publications available at the booth were informational materials about NJLTAP and upcoming workshops, roadway safety proven countermeasures resources, and Build a Better Mousetrap competition entry forms. Our presence at the NJSLOM conference was a great networking opportunity to meet new public works, engineers, and public safety professionals while also reacquainting ourselves with others.

27th Annual NJDOT Research Showcase Recap

The 27th Annual NJDOT Research Showcase brought together New Jersey's transportation community. The event highlighted ongoing research and technology transfer initiatives conducted by NJDOT partners, including institutions of higher education, public agencies, and private-sector organizations. The event took place in-person at Mercer County Community College—with a livestreaming option—from 9:30 AM to 3:00 PM on October 29, 2025.

This year's theme, "Preparing the Workforce for the Future," shaped the morning plenary session. In the afternoon, the Showcase featured presentations on infrastructure, safety, and strategic workforce development and knowledge transfer, delivered by research faculty, staff, students, and private-sector representatives. NJDOT also presented several awards recognizing research and implemented innovations.

Question #1

What are the conditions for an LPA to assist as a supervising agency?

You must include all Federal requirements in the contract and ensure compliance and you must be adequately staffed and equipped to complete the work to the satisfaction of the contract. In other words, you must perform project administration, including inspecting the construction. Consultant engineers and inspectors may be hired to assist with this, but cannot make critical decisions on the public's behalf. There must be an "employee in responsible charge" for each project.

Question #2

What kind of documentation do I need to provide to help support a project's need for a change order?

You will need Accurate records that show the time, labor, equipment, and materials, as well as cost estimates prepared by the agency that can be compared to the costs in the proposed. Also include an evaluation of construction schedule modifications needed and incorporated into the change.
